- Consider large electric delivery vans (just starting to become available)
- Collaborate with other governing bodies
- Plan an electric vehicle session, climate-oriented booklists; YS-themed book displays & themed storytimes
- Check out ideas from Blue Marble Librarians (US)
 https://guides.masslibsystem.org/ClimatePrepWeek/BlueMarbleLibrarians
- Partner with local Fire Dept/WildFire service on how to prepare an emergency kit
- West Van's Fire Dept partnered with us to provide a "Fire Smart" workshop around gardening and landscaping to reduce fire risk (no charge for library)
- Consider session with heat pump community coaches: https://betterhomesbc.ca/community-coach/
- Invasive Species Council will provide free sessions/info to libraries.
- e.g., "Considering a Heat pump" webinar and the West Kootenay Eco Society is facilitating a "Storytelling for Climate Action" workshop.
- Remember your patrons are also experts, particularly during emergencies
- Workshop on re-using paper and discarded book jackets or cardboards to create craft DIY bookmarks and greetings cards or other useful crafts
- BCLA idea: Hire a curator for climate action toolkits and resources.
- Renfrew-Collingwood Seniors' Society's Emergency Support for Seniors Framework includes <u>Extreme Heat & Emergency Preparedness Resource Kits</u> that can be of use to other organizations
