Community Development Days – February 24 & 25, 2022

BCLA'S <u>Community-Led Interest Group (CLIG)</u> organized Community Development Days (CDD) on February 24 and 25, 2022, in order to start the discussion about community development and related topics in an informal setting, with the purpose of knowledge sharing and learning from speakers' experiences. This free, two-day (4 sessions) event, was open to all library workers and students from BC and other provinces and territories. Courtesy of BCLA, this event was hosted over BCLA's Zoom account as a Webinar. Registration was via BCLA and open and accessible to all. Participants didn't need to be a BCLA member, in order to attend.

Due to the sensitivity of the topics and for the sake of unfiltered conversations, we decided not to record any of the sessions. All sessions were facilitated by Shideh Taleban – CLIG's current Chair. With special thanks to North Vancouver City Library Communications Team for creating the poster for this event.

Registration and attendance:

Session 1: 139 registrants, 95 attendees Session 2: 147 registrants, 97 attendees Session 3: 130 registrants, 70 attendees Session 4: 129 registrants, 78 attendees For a virtual event, the attendance rate compared to the registration rate was very good.

Overall, the registration and attendance rate, displayed the thirst and interest about this topic in our profession. The sessions covered a lot of different topics and used different approaches. Attendees mentioned that they liked the order/flow of the sessions – how it began with a broader conversation about what is community-led work, and subsequent sessions explored specific areas. We noticed that conferences can be very corporate-speak or conference-speak, but the sessions were regular everyday conversations about community-led concepts, which made it more accessible and impactful. We found that the webinar format was less distracting for speakers and the chat and Q&A functions gave more people an opportunity to speak and ask questions since not many people may feel comfortable speaking up during a live conference.

Based on the feedback that we received, it was a successful and well-received event. In session 2, there was a discussion in the chat about the Freedom Convoy/Trucker Convoy, which was disruptive, but was handled well by the speakers and facilitator; some attendees noted in their feedback that the situation was a learning opportunity as how to handle hard conversations. We limited the chat to only hosts and speakers after that session.

While we didn't send out a survey afterwards, some colleagues were kind enough to share their feedback with speakers or the CLIG team. Here are some feedback comments we received:
