We hope that this year's conference will inspire you to gaze into the future, revel in the uncertainties and scale new horizons, to then go where no library has gone before!

And let me say, welcome, everyone, to the 2007 BCLA Conference Beyond 20/20: Envisioning the Future. I am looking forward to meeting many of you in person.

His most recent book, The Ghost Map: The Story of London’s Most Terrifying Epidemic—and How It Changed Science, Cities, and the Modern World is a gripping account of the 1854 cholera epidemic in London and of a real-life hero whose map of the outbreak paved the way for the emergence of the modern city. Steven was cofounder and editor-in-chief of FEED, the revolutionary Web magazine blending technology, science and culture with a truly innovative interface. He is a contributing editor to Wired magazine and writes the monthly “Emerging Technology” column for Discover magazine. Steven is a Distinguished Writer in Residence at the New York University Department of Journalism.*

*Eva Miller has over fifteen years of experience in information technology environments, including software companies, graphic design firms and Web publishers. She holds a Master’s degree in information science from the University of Michigan School of Information and was one of Library Journal’s “Movers and Shakers” for 2004 (<http://tinyurl.com/4kag6>). Miller has worked in the areas of reference, training and special projects at Multnomah County Library in Portland, Oregon. With the support of LSTA grants, she launched Oregon’s statewide virtual reference project ([www.oregonlibraries.org](http://www.oregonlibraries.org)) and developed a library-specific content management system called Plinkit ([www.plinkit.org](http://www.plinkit.org)) for smaller public libraries in Oregon, which has since grown into a multi-state effort. Miller recently worked as an information architect with Intel and currently works for ID Branding ([www.idbranding.com](http://www.idbranding.com)), convincing tech-savvy, profit-driven people that librarians have something they want.*

*Stacey Aldrich recently became the Assistant Director of the Omaha Public Library System. Previously she was the Deputy State Librarian at the Maryland State Department of Education, where her primary responsibility was to oversee the implementation of statewide projects. While in Maryland, Stacey played an active role in developing programs, conferences and discussions to help public libraries generate ideas, conversations and innovative programming around future thinking. Stacey also spent six months working with Coates & Jarratt, Inc., a futuring think tank in DC. As she continues to work with Futurist colleagues, it is clear to Stacey that the best way that we can predict the future is to be an active part of its creation. She has an MLS from the University of Pittsburgh, and is a member of the Association of Professional Futurists. E-learning technology is often characterized as a "push" instructional model; conversely, library-provided access to online systems allows students to "pull" information, a service model congruent with progressive education. Librarians participate in e-learning initiatives by providing online reference, instruction, guides and resource lists. CARL librarians instructed over 330,000 students in 2002/2003 and the activity continues to increase. Libraries provide metadata for online materials, link online indexes to individual articles and provide mechanisms for requesting printed articles. Librarians build links from online learning management systems to library resources. The CARL 2005 report on the state of Canadian libraries and e-learning called on librarians to that ensure library services and resources are integrated into e-learning at the institutional, national and international levels and that their expertise inform the e-learning discourse. 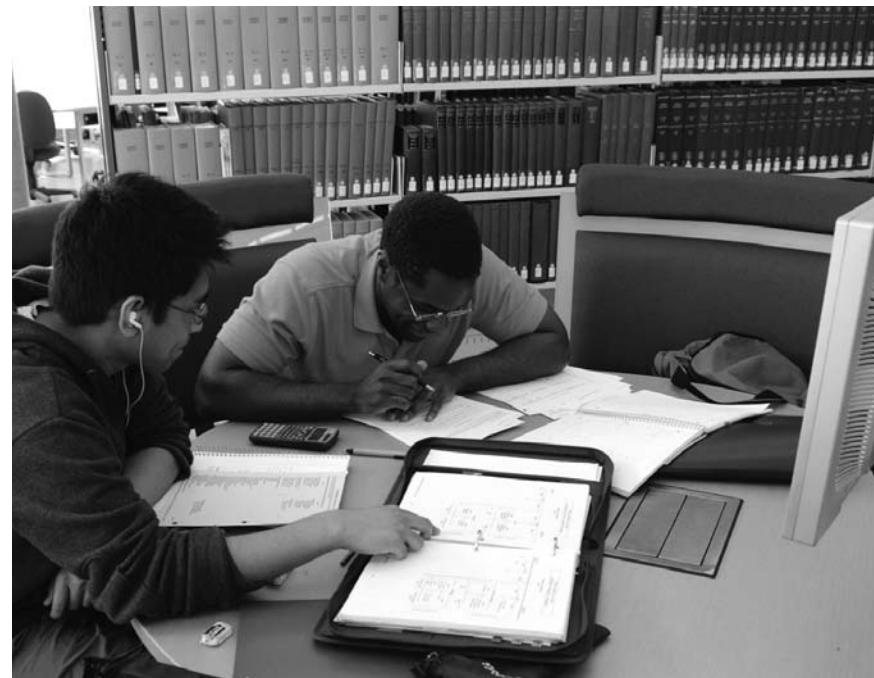
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
